## The Oscar "W" – Paddle Steamer



The *Oscar "W"* is a steam-powered, wood-fired, River Murray paddle steamer that was built in 1908 in Echuca, Victoria, SA by Franz Oscar Wallin and named after his son Oscar who he hoped would take over his shipping business. Sadly young Oscar was killed in WW.1 and the vessel was sold out of Wallin's fleet. The *Oscar "W"* interprets the River Murray trade of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries and is the only River Murray steamer in South Australia able to tow a barge.

In 1914 Wallin sold the vessel to Permewan Wright & Co. In 1919 the Murray Shipping Co. was formed and took over Permewan Wright and the *Oscar "W"*. In 1942 the Murray Shipping Co. turned to the tourist trade and sold off the old work boats including *Oscar "W"*. George Richie of Goolwa bought the vessel and planned to turn it into a tourist paddle steamer, but wartime shortages of materials and labour made this impossible. In 1943 the vessel was sold to the SA Govt. Highways Dept. for use as a ferry. She was converted to oil-burning in 1945. By 1959 a new vessel was needed to carry out this work and in 1960 the *Oscar "W"* was sold to Paddy Hogg for £50. After being used as a tourist and work vessel, in 1964 she was sold to Allan Moritz who initiated restoration, but sadly died before the work was completed. *Oscar "W"* was sold to the SA Tourism Commission who was establishing an Interpretive Exhibition at Goolwa. Funding was made available and she was put into river-worthy condition and steamed to Goolwa on 31<sup>st</sup> March 1998, where, after having received a new wood-fired boiler in 1994, she remains as a working exhibit. Since 2001 the paddle steamer has been owned by the Alexandrina Council and makes regular cruises.

## Did You Know?

### "Spirit of Ecstasy"

100 years ago in February 1911, the artist Charles Sykes presented Rolls-Royce with the sculpture of a flying lady which was to go on to become its mascot the "*Spirit of Ecstasy*".



The Managing Director, Claude Johnson, had commissioned the mascot after owners began fixing 'inappropriate' ornaments to their motor cars. Sykes chose to model his sculpture on the mistress of his friend the 2<sup>nd</sup> Lord Montague of Beaulieu, the Motoring pioneer.



### "Anyone for Tennis?" Wimbledon

Approximately 54,250 balls are used during the Wimbledon fortnight.

Wimbledon has used the same trophies since the 1880's and winners take home a ¾ size replica.

The competition has only been cancelled twice – in WW2, when the Centre Court was bombed and 2020 due to COVID.

Wimbledon's longest ever match took place in 2010 when American John Isner beat Frenchman, Nicolas Mahut in 11 hrs. & 5 mins played over 3 days.

Tennis goers munch their way through approx. 2 million strawberries and 7,000 litres of cream each year.



# “Great Expectations Emigrant Governesses in Colonial Australia”

For educated middle-class women in nineteenth-century Britain, options were limited. Marry and bear children, accept the drudgery of keeping house for relatives or friends or attempt to find a position in one of the very few industries that would employ women. The Female Middle Class Emigration Society scheme helped governesses and would-be governesses immigrate to the colonies from 1861 to 1886. In ‘*Great Expectations*’, Patricia Clarke uses the women’s letters to tell a broader story of emigration, education, class prejudice and the development of Australian Society.




## Acquisitions & Donations
